Lunching with the Grandfathers

The 'Grandfathers' Club' is a quintessentially Shell-Mex and B.P. thing! I was delighted to be invited to their latest lunch - not because I have suddenly become a Grandfather but because I persuaded the members that it was time to feature the Club in the 44 Club News. And it was a delight! Three of my old bosses were there - Bob Blake, Bob Breese and Frank Downes – as well as a few more very familiar to me from my decade in SMBP.

The origins of the Club go back to 1957 when some members of the 'Senior Mess' - the restaurant for the high-priced help in Shell-Mex House - thought that it would be a good idea to form a dining club for the grandfathers among their ranks. The first lunch was on October 23rd of that year and the rules were agreed. You had to be a member of the Mess, a grandfather and be invited to join. It was restricted to 15 members only (later increased to 40) and there were to be two lunches per year. Each lunch was to have a Chairman (by rotation) and the dining was to be good, but not extravagant (though the welcoming drink was Champagne). A convenor was appointed - in nearly 60 years there have been just four; G.H. Selly, Michael Shaw, Clifford Grinsted and John Perry.

Brand Separation did not wither the Grandfathers - the roots were now deep enough for the Club to survive even this trauma. And it is from the Grandfathers that the ideas for an SMBP 44 Association and an SMBP Benevolence Association were to spring. All designed to 'keep alive the spirit and comradeship of SMBP'. Over the years the rules of the Club had to change and now, with the Senior Mess just a memory, membership can be for any grandfather who '...would in due course have become a member of the Senior Mess...'! The Chairman and the Secretary of the 44 Club are also members as well as the President if there is one. These days the Club meets still twice a year in the R.A.F. Club in Piccadilly and the lunch your Editor attended was enjoyed by 13 good men and true – a bit down in numbers from the usual complement. Inevitably this gave rise to a discussion at the lunch on the Club's future and it was decided to put the subject on the agenda again for the next meeting in November. The Convenor has reminded members that 23rd October 2017 will be the 60th anniversary of the Club. My guess is that the members of the Club (currently 35 in total) will want to mark this anniversary in tradional fashion. I'm sure that we all wish them well.

AGM

Spouse Membership

Some of our most active members are widows and widowers of former SMBP employees. Another reason for wanting to improve our collation of information about the passing of members is that we always write to surviving spouses offering condolences and also continued membership of the 44 Club. The information we receive from Shell provides us with the name of the spouse so an invitation is sent – with a good response rate! But unfortunately at present we cannot do the same reliably for our ex BP spouses.

Associate Membership

The redraft of the 44Club Constitution which was approved at the AGM, included clarification of the rules of Associate (used to be Honorary) Membership. We look favourably on requests for Associate Membership, subject only to an application and approval. So for anyone associated with or interested in the Company, or who consider themselves a supporter of the Club, then membership is accessible.

Email Addresses

Thanks to the 'campaign' that's been a feature of this magazine of late we have been very successful in harvesting email addresses. The Club office now has over 650 email addresses on the database. The use of email as a medium of getting notifications out to our members has increased hugely and this has helped keep our costs down. Of the 120 applications for the AGM only 13 of the confirmations we sent out were by post - all the rest via email. Good for the environment, good to demonstrate our efficiency drive with Shell, but not so good for Royal Mail profits! Please be assured there is no intention of replacing paper with the electronic medium - we just want to be efficient and to maximise the use of new technology wherever possible.

Business and pleasure at a lively Annual General Meeting and reunion of the SMBP 44 Association



The 38th AGM and reunion of the 44 Club was held in Shell Centre on Thursday 21st April 2016. Attended by over 120 members the meeting got down to some important business in approving the Club's proposed new constitution before the bar opened and the memories as well as the wine and beer started to flow.

Preece's Treasurer's report likewise. The Club's finances are satisfactory with a year's surplus of £1200 and £11,000 in assets. Rick thanked Nick and Auditor Les Bater for

their work in keeping us solvent. In his report the Chairman said that the main work had been the Study Group in respect of the new constitution linked to creating a new operating structure for the Club on which Ken Longhurst the Group Chairman would report. In other areas he said that the Club still

had over 3000 members and whilst this number would inevitably continue to fall there were new members joining as well. He encouraged members to seek new recruits as word of mouth seemed to be the best way to keep the inflow going.

The Club is becoming digitised with nearly a quarter of all members registering email addresses with the Club office, with a website up and running, and with the magazine also available online. However Rick stressed that communications on paper would also continue for the foreseeable future. As far as the crucial Branch network was concerned Rick said that there were

some holes which it was hoped could be plugged and he commended Bournemouth Secretary Tony Reeve-Parker who had given new life to the Club's branch on the Bournemouth & Southampton Area. Rick said that there were regular reviews with Shell management and that the Club was, as ever, appreciative of the support Shell gives on facilities and funding.

Without this the Club would not exist. There was pressure on budgets in these times of stress owing to the low oil price and the Club would continue to operate as cost-efficiently as it could. The Club continued also to liaise with BP whose support was welcomed.

Rick asked to place on record the Club's deep appreciation of all the many volunteers and supporters in the 'field' - in the Branches – it was thanks to them that the 44 Club remained a vibrant and 'joined-up' organisation. He called on those present, and the membership at large, who were not actively involved to do so if they felt they could.

Finally he paid tribute to those Club members who had died in the past year with a special mention of past Auditor Malcolm Brown and the longtime Secretary of Chelmsford Branch Trefor Everett.

Ken Longhurst introduced the proposed new 44 Club Constitution,

copies of which had been precirculated.
He said that the existing constitution had been unchanged in 30 years and that revision was overdue to reflect the Association

as it is today. The main changes lay in simplifying membership (including Associate membership) and in giving greater flexibility to the field organisation. Branches lay at the heart of our Club and they should be able to organise themselves as their particular circumstances dictate. Flattening the organisation to bring the Branches closer means that Regions would no longer be formally recognised. This would also allow the Executive Committee to be slimmed down to a level more appropriate to the scale and scope of its activities. It will in future comprise 5 elected posts, namely the Chairman, the Treasurer and 3 elected Representatives, plus 2 exofficio members, the Magazine Editor and the Secretary. Other changes included the provision for the Chairman (rather than President) to take the Chair at the AGM, and for the meeting quorum to be established

at 40 rather than
the current 20. The
proposed constitution
provides that the
Executive Committee
be comprised of the
Chairman, Treasurer
and Secretary
plus (ex officio)
the Editor of the
Magazine and
three elected

Committee members.

Five of the committee (out of seven members) would be elected.

A member asked for clarification about how Branches would relate to the Executive Committee. The Chairman said that they would relate directly and that there would be no use of regional coordinators as a conduit. Another member asked whether existing Regional Coordinators were happy with the proposal. The Secretary said that there had been a mixed response and that for some they were difficult to accept. The Chairman emphasised that whilst delayering is appropriate for a contracting organisation, flexibility remains the key. There is no intention to stop people doing useful things in the field so in parts of the Country where for instance active Branch co-ordination is an effective mechanism, long may it continue.

The proposed new constitution was put to the meeting and approved.

The Chairman paid tribute to retiring Executive Committee members Greta Chandler, John Burton, John Harvey, Charles Richards, Pat Withers and Bill Scott.

In the Elections of the
Officers and Committee Rick
Westley and Nick Preece
were re-elected Chairman and
Treasurer respectively and Ken
Longhurst, David Seymour and
Brammer Allport were elected as
Committee members.

The Chairman announced that longstanding supporters and previous officers of the Club Derek Higgins and Peter Cast had accepted the appointment as a Vice President of the Club.

The formal part of the meeting concluded with three cheers for Her Majesty the Queen on the day of her 90th birthday, and the bar opened!

Hugh Wickham (1)

I came across a quote from Robert Louis Stevenson recently "That a Person is a Success who has lived well, laughed often and loved much" and thought



how apt it was as a memory of my friend Hugh Wickham (whose death at the age of 88 is reported in the Obituaries). From his early years in Shell in the 1960s via a time with SMBP and subsequently in his successful career in Shell UK, Hugh was one of the most skilled practitioners in the art of communications in all its forms. His talks on the North Sea in the 1970s and later his involvement in the advertising campaigns - corporate and Retail and Lubricants - were all memorable contributions. As a person he was infectiously cheerful and energetic and he loved life in all its forms. He started a Wine Club as a student and founded the "Puritans Hockey Club" in which among other things he was the leader of the sing songs at festivals and tournaments.

After Shell, Hugh became a Corporate Relations consultant to Golf's 'European Tour' where he was a popular figure. Ken Schofield, Chief Executive of the European Tour from 1975 – 2004 described Hugh as a 'true gentleman' who "gave the Tour wisdom and integrity that assisted our culture at a time of considerable growth...his people skills were of legendary proportion and to the best of my recollection, we never saw Hugh flustered, nor with a negative word or thought regarding anyone or anything."

Brand Separation (1)

For several months in 1975 I worked on the brand separation of products, customers and staff.

I was given the task of identifying any products with a small sales volume which could be uniquely branded to one brand. I went through the list of SMBP products making my recommendations until I came to one product where the decision seemed to have already been made since the last letters of the product name were BP. However, it turned out that those letters stood for British Pharmacopoeia! I also devised and implemented a system for branding the myriad of small Industrial customers in each Sales Area so that 60% of the sales volume was allocated to Shell and 40% to BP.

Brand Separation (2)

I was intrigued to read in the letters column of 44 Club News the question from Tom Cannon about how Brand Separation actually worked. Perhaps I could give a partial answer - I'm sure there are others.

Leading up to Brand Separation I worked as a lowly marketing assistant in Maidstone area office, having served my time in SE Regional office in Knightsbridge (yes Sir, no Sir, I know I don't deserve a pay rise Sir, and I promise to put my jacket on when not sitting at my desk Sir!). Maidstone was a great place to work, made even more so by Peter Ost, a memorable Area Manager. So, imagine a country house hotel outside Maidstone with Peter in the chair and twenty or so Reps all assembled with their computer printouts showing their customers' offtakes. My job was to keep a tally of volumes, honestly! We knew one of the tasks ahead of separation was to allocate customers on a 60/40 split Shell/BP for fuel and a 80/20 split for lubes. So the proceedings started with Peter asking for large volumes of fuel, with customers then being allocated to either Shell or BP. decamping off for a celebratory drink we could say we delivered what was asked, everyone was happy and there wasn't a computer in sight. That's my recollection of Brand Separation, no more no less! (Incidentally, my fiancé, who worked at Hemel, decided she wanted to be BP and I wanted to stay Shell but I convinced her that "she can be sure of Shell" (as well as me) so we married in 1975 and moved to Wythenshawe).


