


Welcome

When we have big birthdays it concentrates the mind. Your Editor has just experienced the move into the seventh age of man - so far without too much second childishness. And the teeth, eyes, and taste, seem to be holding up. For the moment.

But mortality is more present when you accept that even by the wildest stretch of the imagination you can't be regarded as being in 'late middle-age' any more. You're old!

All that said the changes in longevity of the past 25 years or so have been astonishing. Life expectancy at 65 for women is 22 years and for men a year or so less. That's an increase of eight years since 1992 which is pretty remarkable.



Less scientifically, but closer to home, I checked the average age of the Obits in the Club News of December 1980. It was 73. In the most recent Club News the average was 90. Even allowing for the two centenarians in the recent list this does suggest what the national statistics prove – we are, on average, living a lot longer. As a Trustee of the Shell Contributory Pension Fund for four years I saw from close, how longevity was a key factor in the Fund's 'Liability' calculations. Even for a closed Fund (which the SCPF now is) ever rising life expectancy places an additional burden on the Fund's managers and Trustees. The SCPF is coping well with the challenge – as is the equivalent BP Fund - but longevity will be sure to concentrate minds and perhaps lead to some different investment models which are much more liability driven.

Increasingly the issue with old age is not so much the quantum – how old you are – but the quality. In the 44 Club we have large numbers of members in their late 80s and 90s for whom the quality of life is still pretty high - the odd creaking joint apart. What's not to like? But, of course, we also have members of similar ages or younger for whom life is more of a struggle. Here the 44 Club performs a vital function providing both companionship and often practical help. And for the Companies that underwrite our pensions there is arguably more to do than 'just' paying the pension on time. Let's hope that 'duty of care' continues to be extended to former employees beyond the legal requirement for the Pension Funds to pay the pension.



The opening of Shell-Mex House in 1933 – a 'Symbol of confidence' in British industry.






In 2013, eighty years on from the opening of Shell-Mex House in 1933, we missed the opportunity to look back at a building that was so important to so many of us in our Shell-Mex and B.P. and, for the Shell folk amongst us, Shell careers. But better late than never! For once the word 'iconic' is appropriate when we describe Shell-Mex House - its Art Deco style and architectural originality did, and does, make it one of London's most significant modern landmarks. If we compare a photograph from 1933 with one from today nothing much has changed (we'll pass over the outrage that the building is now called '80 The Strand'!).

The 1933 photo comes from one of the treasures in the SMBP archive - the 'guide-book' produced for the opening ceremony on 25th January 1933. After the ceremony guests



were invited to tour the building and then to tea in the Restaurant and cocktails, at 5:30pm, on the Fifth Floor. The opening ceremony was conducted by Walter Runciman who was President of the Board of Trade and curiously in his speech, and in the news report in The Times which followed, the company was referred to as 'Shell-Mex Limited' - though the booklet makes it clear that it was to be 'Shell-Mex and B.P. Limited' (formed just a year earlier on 1st January 1932) which would occupy the building. Runciman ignored BP when praising the 'amazing rapidity of the growth of the Shell Company' and the 40% owners of the company, and the building, got no mention in the press either.

In thanking Runciman Shell Chairman Lord Bearsted (Walter Samuel the son of the founder of Shell Transport and Trading Marcus Samuel) said



that he hoped Shell-Mex House would be "a symbol of the eventual emergence of British industry from its present struggles". At that time the depression had led to unemployment at an all-time high of more than 20% (over three million). Runciman replied that "there is no reason why we should despair for the future... so long as enterprise and courage are to be found in commercial circles there is hope for the country." He also said, "you must not look for new developments in the commercial world beginning in Downing Street... once the manufacturing and industrial people in this country rely upon Governments... for their success the days of our greatness are numbered." This was a ringing endorsement of free enterprise from a man who was a Liberal and a member of Ramsay MacDonald's "National" Government.

So from its opening Shell-Mex House was seen as a sign of free enterprise – a 'Symbol of Confidence'. There may be a touch of hyperbole about this but it is also a function of how important Shell-Mex and B.P. in its early years was to be in helping

the consumption-led recovery which did indeed begin in 1933. House construction and car ownership boomed and the beginnings of a consumer society can be seen in those pre-war years – and you need plenty of petroleum products to fuel this!

Back to the opening ceremony and the tour of the building. The 'guide-book' stresses its modernity - including the housing of an airconditioning system in the clock tower which it calls, rather quaintly, a 'mechanical breathing system'. It also stresses the use of British 'Portland Stone' both externally and internally rather than marble which would have been '...in the hands of foreigners' (!) The overall scale is impressive; 1486 windows, 27,000 panes of glass, twenty-two miles of hot and cold water pipes and so on. Including the basement and the sub-basement there are fifteen floors - some of which are illustrated. Here is the sixth floor with the Department names written in:

The significance of opening of Shell-Mex House in 1933 cannot be overstated either in the political/ economic circumstances of the time or in respect of the commercial opportunity for Shell-Mex and B.P. that it symbolised. The guide-book says 'Modern enterprises must always tend to centralisation... they must expand without loss of central efficiency' and SMBP had been formed very much with this in mind. In effect the technical monopoly that SMBP was endorsed at the building's opening by Walter Runciman.

Chillingly 1933 was also the year that Adolf Hitler became Chancellor and effectively shortly afterwards Dictator of Germany. Within six short years Britain would be at war again and Shell-Mex House became the home of the Petroleum Board. It's idle to speculate what might have happened had SMBP not had the hiatus of the war years. But after the war SMBP's return to competitive marketing, as we know, saw twentyfive years of growth and profitable trading. Throughout the 44 years of the company's existence Shell-Mex House was the powerhouse of progress. PSB

Brand Separation (1)

My recollection is that the manager responsible for finding a mechanism to allocate, on a neutral basis, the Industrial customers 60/40 was Mike Walker. He asked various people for ideas, one of whom was Anne Marriott who worked in Operational Research. She came up with the method that was used to do the firstcut 60/40 split. This involved putting all Industrial customers within each SMBP sales territory in descending annual volume order for Fuel Oil offtake (Fuel Oil being the largest volume product overall). The list for each Territory was then divided into groups of 10 (thus the first group was the largest down to the 10th largest, the next group the 11th to 20th, and so on). Within each group, the 1st, 3rd, 5th, 6th, 8th and 10th were allocated to Shell, and the 2nd, 4th, 7th and 9th to BP (note the discontinuity in the middle!). Those customers, who didn't buy Fuel Oil, were then listed by the next largest overall product, which was Gas Oil, and the same system applied. Those who didn't buy Fuel Oil or Gas Oil were ordered by the next product and so on until all customers had been allocated. The resulting product splits were remarkably close to 60/40. There were some later subtle refinements (not least for LPG, which was split 80/20, and for branded Lubricants), but this was the basic principle used! (I was easily the most junior member of Jack Cook's Industrial Brand Separation Team from Nov 1972 to March 1973!)

Brand Separation (2)

Further to the letter from Tom Cannon in issue 150 and your appeal for information on how they separated the 'Shell Sheep' from the 'BP Goats' at Brand Separation let me give you my memory of what we were told at the time.

Each line manager was tasked with allocating his staff on a 60/40 basis however the line manager would be the last to know whether he or she would be a Sheep or a Goat. I am not aware of the criteria to be used e.g. age, colour of hair, old school tie, golf club, length of service, etc.! At the time I had recently been appointed as one of the first Shift Managers at Point Law Terminal, Aberdeen, and had moved north from my Operations Engineering role in the Glasgow Regional Office. No doubt, in common with other SMBP Terminals, some of our number were easier to work with than others. Following the announcement of who was going where at Point Law one of the Shop Stewards came to me and disputed the Company line on the allocating manager being the last to know which Brand they would join! Looking at the list I had to agree but could only repeat what I had been told. Imagine our surprise when the Manager's Brand became known, and the Shop Steward was kind enough to come back and apologise for doubting my story.

It will be interesting to hear if this memory is shared by others. (Names not given to protect the innocent!)

(Ed: Thanks for the memory Ron. The BPA was one of SMBP's last major initiatives. It opened in 1969 with the United Kingdom Oil Pipeline (UKOP) (owned by a consortium of oil companies) white oil pipeline which connected the (then) two Shell refineries at Shell Haven and Stanlow. On Brand Separation BPA remained a Shell/BP joint venture though, as you say, its management transferred to BP Oil. If any readers have memories of BPA in its early (SMBP) days do get in touch.)

Ben Hurley

I was sorry to hear of the passing of Ben Hurley. Some people evoke a strong reaction - one pace forward Ben Hurley! His demise saddens me immensely. Any meeting of the Institute of Mechanical Engineers was enlivened by his contributions. His resonant voice and choice turns of phrase always made its mark on the audience. Ben was a graduate engineer who had worked with Harry Ferguson, Douglas Motor Cycles and with bearings, piston and piston ring manufacturers. Make Money

Reference the piece about 1966 and the World Cup, with special interest in Make Money in the recent Club News.

At that time, in Shell-Mex House, if you were below a certain grade you had to work one Saturday morning per month. One of my Saturdays was the day of the World Cup Final. I spent most of the morning answering the phone to dealers who had run out of Make Money coupons, or were about to do so. Of course, I could not help, apart from taking names etc. and promising to do more on Monday. I remember walking from Shell-Mex House to Charing Cross to catch my train home and buying an Evening Standard to read on the train that our team for the Final would not have Jimmy Greaves in it!

Eighteen years, later in April 1984, I was Manager of Retail Sales Department when we launched a new Shell Make Money. Happily for us, the 1966 team left a long report on their promotion with successes and weak points, and one vital piece of



advice. In 1966, for security reasons, all the coupons were printed in USA and freighted over to Heathrow. During June 1966, a number of cases were stuck in Heathrow freight and not passed by customs, so Dealers ran out which was very embarrassing. Consequently, in 1984 all the coupons were printed in England, with special care taken with the printer on the matter of security. Only one £10,000 ticket was printed for each Region, and a member of my team was present to witness their printing, and then that plate was smashed to avoid unauthorised duplication. Happily for the promotion, all the £10,000coupons were redeemed.

As a matter of interest, the most successful promotion in terms of fuel sales was not Make Money but a Soup Bowls offer in the spring of 1986! Those were the great days of happy Dealers, happy drivers in Distribution and happy, motivated staff all round.

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
