# Welcome

The opening of L.P.Hartley's great novel 'The Go-Between' – "The past is a foreign country: they do things differently there" has perhaps become a little clichéd through overuse, but it is no less true for that. In the book the main character, Leo Colston, looks back fifty years from 1953 to events that took place at the turn of the century. Edwardian England seen from the perspective of the new Elizabethan age. In this edition of the 'Club News' we look back even longer with Mike Howard to the immediate post-war Shell-Mex and B.P. and discover a thread which, whilst especially present in Mike's career and life, is perhaps also relevant to all of us. In the article I described that thread as 'loyalty' but it is also 'trust' – the two things are inextricably linked. You are loyal in part because you count on loyalty in return. And you count on it because you trust those you are loyal to - and they trust you back. An implicit part of all this is honouring promises made. Shell-Mex and B.P. was not perfect by any means – but loyalty and trust were core values and the offer that most of us received, though never explicitly stated of course, was of a 'job for life' – if that's what we wanted. This was the norm of the times. Mike Howard's father Cecil completed 45 years of service with the GPO in 1965 when he retired. He said then to his staff "... I carry with me a very real admiration for the splendid way in which the staff strive and pull together in their endeavour to give a high standard of service..." When Mike himself retired from Shell in 1987 after 38 years he could have said the same and meant it - he probably did!

The risk of being over-nostalgic is to think that the 'foreign country' of our past was always better than where we live today. Was the 'job for life' that most of us in the 44 Club enjoyed necessarily more fulfilling than the 'regular change of employer' working life that is more the norm today? This is very personal. In my SMBP/Shell career I lived and worked in five different real countries and travelled to many, many more on business. That was important for me – but it wouldn't suit everyone. The thing with a multinational like Shell was that in the 'good old days' you really could match job to lifestyle - there was room to get the work/life balance right. Today it is much less so – the employer calls the tune and you lump it or like it. Where loyalty and trust governed our working lives, that of our successors today is far less paternalistic - I guess our children and grandchildren know and accept this. But when these new management imperatives also apply in a Corporation's dealings with its ex-employees/pensioners this can cause tensions. We cry 'foul' because our norms are (perhaps) seen as 'old-fashioned'. We tend to think they are better – that is our right. I doubt that any members reading this would disagree with the assertion that loyalty and trust - our norms - were values that should never have gone away! In my four years as a Trustee of the Shell Contributory Pension Fund I saw at close guarters the contrast of cultures and expectations that I brought from a Shell career which started in 1964 compared with the Shell norms of today.

This contrast was by no means always counter-productive, but sometimes it was. That the baby-boomers are a lucky generation is not, I think, in dispute. Few of us need encouragement to enjoy our retirement and we are fortunate we have a Shell or BP pension which, along with our State pension, gives us an agreeable time. We earned it! To serve our fellow retirees with voluntary work – especially for the 44 Club of course – is something that is both fulfilling and which gives a little back. The 44 Club needs more volunteers from the newly retired generation. Can you help either at Branch or at National level? There's plenty to do and we need you!

# **Shell Pensioner Support**

Here is an update from Jonathan Kohn at Shell on progress in developing new Pensioner support following the demise of the PLR scheme:

"I am pleased to report progress continues to be made to get the new Shell Pensioner support model up and running.

A contract for BUPA to provide a professionally run telephone line which will provide advice and support for Shell pensioners on a range of issues has now been signed. Work is being undertaken on the process to refer pensioners to the SPA and SPBA as needed, in advance of a go-live targeted for the 1st November.

Recruitment of the six Pensioner Programme Officers (PPO) and Pensioner Programme Manager, who will maintain contact with pensioners in need, is underway. Four of the seven appointments have now been made and interviews scheduled for the remaining vacancies.

There are also plans to improve the co-ordination across the various strands of support for Shell alumni – BUPA helpline, the PPO team, pensioner associations and the SPBA – to better enable them to provide integrated support to the pensioner community.

Further information on the new approach, including details of the new BUPA helpline will be communicated directly to pensioners during October in advance of the November 1st go-live date. In the meantime as previously advised the SPBA will continue to provide valuable financial and other support to the most vulnerable pensioners. Going forward, referrals will be passed from the new SPA team of pensioner representatives but until this network is up and running pensioners in urgent need of support may apply directly to the SPBA - preferably by e-mail (lan.C.Landeryou@shell.com or ken.k.sleat@shell.com) or by mail to Shell Pensioners Benevolent Association, Shell Centre, 40 Bank Street, London SE1 7NA. # Mike Howard – coming out of his Shell to reminisce over nearly 70 years of service



I was reminded of something Charles M Schwab (the American steel magnate) said about loyalty after I spent a couple of hours with Mike Howard:

"Make your employer feel truthfully that you are sincere with him; that you are going to promote his interest; that you are going to stand for the things which he represents; that you are proud of being a member of his staff, and there is nothing that will reap you a richer reward. Loyalty above all!"

Loyalty may in these harsher times be an underrated (even lost) idea. But for Mike, from the age of 16 in 1949 when he joined Shell-Mex and B.P., to today loyalty has underpinned everything that he has done. And over that time loyalty willingly given has led to loyalty received – a two-way process.

Mike was born in Wimbledon, where his father worked for the GPO, in 1933. His education therefore took place in part during the war years - first locally and then at Kingston Grammar School. Here he made good academic progress and crucially his sporting talent, especially on the Hockey pitch,

was also revealed. As with many in their mid-teens in those years he left school at 16 and Shell-Mex and B.P. was one of the two companies his Careers Master recommended. An interview with Bob Ingle and Freddie Long led to a job offer at the princely sum of £3 2s 6d per week and 'Hope's Box' in Shell-Mex House was to be his first office. Mr Hope ran a service for the Directors and their Secretaries on the sixth floor. His young men - all in their late teens ran errands and did other menial tasks for the high-priced help. There was no formal training and the tasks were not challenging. But, as Mike says, it was a handy first step in the Company for a year or so. Off his own bat Mike studied Finance and Accounting at Night School and it was this initiative which probably secured him his first proper job after seven months - as a Trainee Clerk in HO Accounts Sales. There was a row of desks and Mike had the newcomer's one - he was told it would take 40 years to progress to the one by the window!

Accounts were very labour-intensive in the early 1950s – there were a lot of clerks - but the manual nature of everything was a good apprenticeship. There was early contact with the marketers as well – a young David Soame was PA to a Sales Manager and he needed help from Mike to access



sales and other data. This was the beginning of a friendship that was to last more than thirty years. Soon, however, all this was interrupted by the call-up for National Service in the RAF. 2531494 Howard enjoyed this – though he thinks that one year would have been enough. A fellow 'erk' was the great cricketer Fred Trueman – another long enduring friendship which was to include some golfing days over the years. Trueman played a fair bit of cricket – he was in the RAF 'sports section' – including getting leave of absence to make his

Test debut in 1952 at Leeds when he took 7 for 116 and helped reduce India to 26-5 in their



second innings! Mike Howard's sporting achievements were a little less, but he still played high standard tennis and hockey for the RAF and enjoyed the camaraderie.

Back in SMBP in 1953 Mike continued his career in Finance and his studies (successfully). Now in Accounts Admin under Denis Field and Harry Cleeves he was allowed to visit Division offices around the country advising on financial procedures required by new legislation – quite a accolade for a young man still only 21. Away from work he was pursuing his sporting life - including tennis and hockey at both BP Sydenham and Shell Lensbury, Teddington. It was at Sydenham that, in 1954, at a 'Halford Memorial' tennis match versus London Division he met Maureen Shapland. They were to be engaged in 1956 and to marry in 1958 but not before the archaic rules that did not allow a husband and wife both to work for SMBP had to be applied and Maureen

had reluctantly to leave the company! In Club News 125 in 2009 we ran the story of how Mike and his friend John Fulcher bought a taxi for £25 in 1954 and which they named 'Howorful'. They fell on their feet the next year when during a rail strike the Company paid them to bring employees to Shell-Mex House – where it was allocated a parking space alongside the Directors' limousines (Photo: Mike at the wheel -page 4)!


Back in Shell-Mex House Mike's career took another step forward when in 1955 he was moved to Audit Department under RG Nicholson. Key to his appointment, and indeed to the Audit role, was the need for attention to detail and good communication skills. The detail was shown in a lovely story about an audit in No.1 Kingsway. The audit showed a small daily payment to a local florist. Odd! Until it was realised that this was for Mark Mothio's red carnation! The communications skills came from handling the sensitivities with the all-powerful Division Managers who in those days were very much Kings of their Regions. I asked Mike how 'straight' SMBP was and he says that in the main it was a pretty honest operation - though there were irregularities which



a young auditor had to handle with care. And not just the odd carnation! But he was, he says, made welcome everywhere and Audit was a good training ground for his further progress in Finance which continued for the rest of the decade and into the 1960s. He worked on procedures, the Finance Authorities manual and in other control areas – mainly in Shell-Mex House.

The 1960s were to be marked by the first introduction of data processing by computer and SMBP built its first computer centre in Hemel Hempstead. The shrewd and capable Brian

Bowden was Hemel's first Manager and he realised after a while that he needed someone to handle the increasingly complex financial and control systems. Mike's appointment to this role was important both careerwise and personally. He and Maureen and their (now) young family moved from Worcester Park to Watford to commence a long life together in leafy Hertfordshire. Hemel was a tough working environment - the need to meet deadlines at a time of rather rudimentary computers was stressful - something that Frank Irving the Systems head realised. In 1967 he asked Dick Baylis (Chairman) and and Mike (Secretary) to launch a 'Golf Section' based at Berkhamsted Golf Club - they played every Monday evening in the summer. Mike had played some golf over the vears but this initiative was not just popular among the Hemel staff but what was to launch Mike's long golfing career and his now nearly 50 year membership of the Berkhamsted Club. Within a year or so of starting to play regularly Mike had joined the Club and his handicap was falling to 17 by 1968 and later as low as 6. He was Captain in 1987/8 and had his lowest round there in that year - a 3 over par 74 (net 64!).

Running in parallel with Mike's golf though one feels, only slightly ahead of golf in his priorities, was Mike's SMBP career. This was to move forward again in 1970 when he was offered a job in the new (post McKinsey) 'Consumer Markets Division' in Shell-Mex House under Derek Higgins (A 'great boss'). The job was a Finance one but now, for the first time, he was in the colourful world of the Marketer. Consumer's task was to manage the company's relationship with its 'Authorised Distributor' (AD) network. This was complex and diverse enough but further complicated by the fact that the early 1970s were the run-up to Brand Separation – and that the Distributors had to be 'separated' into Shell and BP like everything else. Factor in the quadrupling of Oil Prices and the consequential decline of ambitions for the expansion of the Domestic Market and you can see that these were challenging times. Mike had what was called 'AD Remuneration' under his financial control and this had to tread the tricky path of being adequate to remunerate the ADs fairly but not too costly to keep SMBP's cost basis in this sector acceptable. Mike says that the culture of Marketing was very different to that of Finance and the Computer Centre. There were more 'characters' and, in some cases, the behaviours were more unpredictable – and much less attuned to working by the book! But it was satisfying and stimulating work each of the ADs was its own business and they varied enormously in size and scope - though the basic tasks they did on SMBP's behalf were the same. Brand Separation was especially complex. Mike knew quite early on that he was going to Shell and that his friend and colleague Rex Hatcher would be going to BP, and this helped as they worked together to get an equitable split of the network.

The successor to Consumer was 'Heating and Agricultural Division' and Mike was to take up the role of 'Head of Finance and Administration' an organisation which with some changes was to continue post Brand Separation. In 1977 some changes were made in Shell UK Oil and the new organisation shows some familiar 44 Club Faces alongside Mike's in his 'Finance and Admin' job.

Between 1977 and 1987 when he retired Mike Howard was to stay at the heart of the world of Shell distributors



in Distributor Department (managed initially by David Soame who went on to Head up Commercial Division) which organised to the realities of the new Brand Separated world. Soame Mike regards as 'another great boss' and it is clear that the loyalty he gave to David was repaid in kind. "David Soame was always on my side" he says. Mike moved from the purely financial in some of his roles which latterly had a broader management character to them – as Commercial Services Manager and as Chairman of the AD Devon Fuels for example. The Distributor Trade team originally established under David Soame was a strong group which endured into post Shell life and which still has regular reunions - Mike organised these gatherings for 20 years. Post retirement Mike did a couple of year's consultancy for the big AD William Cory helping them establish a structure for the future but after that he decided that his other interests would take over from work.

Mike Howard's 84 years have followed a not unfamiliar pattern for SMBP alumni. A successful career, a happy family life and a commitment to extracurricular activity (in his case golf) which was no less dedicated. Mike has gone one step further with his long service to the SMBP 44 Association. His local Branch is South Midlands and he has been on their Committee for many years and was Chairman for ten. The Branch is one of the most successful in the 44 Club and has a strong membership (80% ex Hemel) and good officers. "Listen to what the members tell you" was what Mike said when I asked him the reason for the Branch's success. In addition Mike has helped with the overall operation of the 44 Club

centrally – he did the diaries for many years and has sat on the Executive Committee. He is a Vice President of the Club.

In telling Mike Howard's story, space constraints have forced selectivity! So mention of his tennis and hockey successes as a young man (and into later life actually) - not least his 40 year playing career for Lensbury Hockey will have to be brief. And there's no room to mention his birdie on the 1st at St Andrews or his various holes in one! However we can't omit mention of the day that he and Maureen met the Queen at the Royal South of England Agricultural Show to present Shell trophies but Bob Reid forbade the publication of a photo of him with HMQ (though one with Maureen was OK!). Bob rewarded Mike for his obeying his instructions by playing a round of golf with him at Berkhamsted.

I asked Mike if he had a message for members and characteristically he gave one that is both personal and helpful. Fifteen years ago he was diagnosed with prostate cancer. The diagnosis came not from any symptoms but from a regular check-up. The cancer was treated with radiotherapy and it has not returned. The moral of the story.

Gentlemen – get yourself tested!

Mike Howard had a nasty accident earlier this year collapsing at home due to a blood infection and breaking his ankle. This is on the mend and though his golf has to be from a Buggy at the moment he hopes to get back to walking the course soon. This most loyal of SMBP/Shell men has a few more rounds in him yet! **PSB**

# West London Pipeline

I would like to expand on an aspect in Ernie Choules's letter (Club News 155). This is the United Kingdom Oil Pipeline (UKOP) connection to Heathrow. By 1969 this connection from aviation fuel storage at Buncefield was in operation but SMBP had not yet joined this separate UKOP consortium for the West London Pipeline. They had rights to buy into it which they did at the very last moment, January 1969, but withheld using it for some time.

It would have been an easy engineering job to make the necessary connections to Heathrow aviation fuel storage. But, the British Airports Authority (BAA) was on the watch. BAA had introduced a levy on each litre of fuel dispensed on

the airport which replaced cheap rents for land on the airport occupied by oil companies. But SMBP still retained these rents which included the right to use the Walton/Heathrow pipeline for their supplies. BAA saw their chance as their price for a SMBP connection to the West London Pipeline on the airport was to impose a fuel levy on SMBP as well.

In the end SMBP paid BAA a lump sum based on 50% of an estimated cost of laying a new pipeline around the perimeter of Heathrow to connect into the Walton/Heathrow pipeline for which SMBP retained rights. The BAA official was the redoubtable Mrs Smith who was just short of chess international standard and who had issued instructions that all oil company engineering proposals on the airport were submitted to her so she could work out if she could squeeze out an extra charge.

The West London Pipeline has two pipelines where normally one would suffice. This was because Texaco still had airline customers, Sabina and Air Canada, who used a blend of kerosene and gasoline (Avtag) for their aircraft fuel instead of kerosene (Avtur now known as Jet A1). These two fuels could not share the same pipeline. Avtag was soon phased out but the West London Pipeline was left with a legacy of two lines.

demonstrated to me when Distribution Division were announcing that the improvements to IT and telephone systems meant that Aberdeen would cease to be a Group Terminal, with all order-taking and routeing to be transferred to Bishopbriggs Group Terminal. Commercial's largest customer in the Aberdeen Group area was a major local authority, with hundreds of individual delivery points for Gas Oil, Diesel, and Petrol. Many of the Gas Oil (heating oil) locations were schools, supplied on a 'Shell Retained Account' basis by the Shell Distributor, Gleaner Oils, but, as was the system then, all delivery points for Gas Oil of 4,500 litres and over, were direct delivered by SUKO vehicles. The customer's

Purchasing Manager refused to accept the transfer of order-taking from Aberdeen to Bishopbriggs and forecast that routers based in Glasgow would not know the rural locations in NE Scotland, with chaos ensuing. The stand-off continued for several weeks. Finally, I asked George to come to a meeting with me, with the Purchasing Manager and his deputy, and we met for lunch in one of the new 'oil boom' hotels not far from the Shell Terminal. Relations remained pleasant and 'non-personal' but nothing was moving forward. At some point near the end of lunch the Purchasing Manager got up to 'visit the facilities'. George made an immediate decision. 'Excuse me', he said, 'but I need

to go too'. The Deputy PM and I continued talking and we could see George and the PM standing deep in conversation near the restaurant entrance. When they returned to the table the PM said that all was resolved and he would now accept SUKO's decision. We all shook hands and departed. I asked George what had changed. All he would say, with a smile, was that 'you must never let your negotiating opponents box themselves into a corner; you must allow them a way out where they retain their dignity'. What a star!

active mentally and as far as we are able physically," he says. Not keeping busy is just not an option for the couple as Jean, who retired at 65 from working as a secretary for BP, admits: "When I retired, I hated it. I really missed work."

A highlight of the couple's life was to be among the crowds for the Queen's Coronation in 1953. They were recently featured on the Timewatch television programme about the event, recalling their 20-hour wait to see the coach and procession. Sadly only three people are still alive who were at their wedding in 1947, but the couple say it seems no time at all since they were celebrating their golden wedding at St Michael's Manor in St Albans."
