

Welcome Guest Editorial by John Bamberg

In the early autumn of 1954, I was nearing the end of 2 years National Service in the RAF. At that time, we were given permission to go for job interviews so that we had employment to go to after we were demobbed. I went for four – Marks and Spencer, Metal Box, British Oxygen and Shell-Mex and B.P.

At my interview in Shell-Mex House I was greeted by a charming secretary, escorted to a waiting room and offered tea or coffee with biscuits. I was also offered repayment for the cost of travel to get to the interview, but I pointed out that as a serviceman I had been given a free travel voucher. Nonetheless, she insisted and gave me the cost of the rail ticket – about four shillings, I believe! I was interviewed by a gentleman named Jackson, an Assistant Manager in Staff Department, who I soon discovered was an avid sport fan. Early in the interview he asked me what sports I played, and when I said I had played rugby for Eastern Counties that was the end of the formal interview – we spent the remainder of the time talking sport! One statement he made has stayed with me for life – in describing the culture of SMBP, he said "…you'll find less sh*ts per square yard in Shell-Mex and B.P. than anywhere else"!

sh*ts per square yard in Shell-Mex and B.P. than anywhere else"! Following that enjoyable experience, I had no difficulty deciding to accept the SMBP job offer that followed - a decision I have never regretted.



I joined SMBP at the start of 1955 as a statistical clerk in 'Trade Relations' - that was the rather odd name for the Statistics and Economics Department. I then spent the next 35 happy years

in a wide variety of different roles in Admin, Operations and Sales in SMBP and then in Shell UK Oil. This was only interrupted, in 1979, by a three year stint seconded to Shell International. That represented a marked change of style and culture. I had a sort of consultancy job in Retail where I had virtually no power or authority - almost the only work I had to do was that required of me by Operating Companies. If they wanted support or advice from me regarding strategy or capital or revenue budgets, they would have to ask for me to visit them and bear all my travel and living costs. Fortunately I was sufficiently sought after to see the world, First Class, at Shell's expense! From that, I developed a taste for international travel which has stayed with me in retirement.

I was fortunate that my Shell International job was at a time when there were two 'rules' from which I benefitted. One was a Government decision to allow all time spent abroad on business to be tax free! The other, an internal one, was that if you spent a significant amount of time away from home, your wife could join you on a business visit overseas and be treated as a Company employee. Those were the days!

I look back on 35 years of employment and 30 years of retirement with unadulterated pleasure. I found SMBP/Shell UK Oil to be honourable Companies in which Management trusted staff, and vice versa; and customers trusted the Company, and vice versa. It gave me a happy working life, both whilst at work and at home, and a happy retirement. It also gave me several life-long friends.

What's not to like?!

BP Society

In the spirit of ensuring that membership of the BP Society is available to as many BP alumni as possible, the BPS Council, at its meeting in December, agreed to allow alumni who are not in receipt of a BP pension to join.

The Society already has some members who are not BP Pensioners, but the numbers are limited and applications have needed to be agreed on a case by case basis to manage the administration. Now, the BP Society website can facilitate all non-pensioner BP alumni to join the Society quickly and easily.

The Council decision also enables all employees from the former Shell-Mex and B.P. Ltd. to join the Society. Following the Brand Separation of Shell-Mex and B.P only those employees who moved to BP, and later became BP retirees, were entitled to become Society members. The new rule means that **all** former employees of Shell Mex and B.P. can now join the Society even if they went to Shell on Brand Separation and are Shell Pensioners! This has been done to allow all SMBP alumni to re-establish contact with their former friends and colleagues.

You can register with the Society for free and share news with other members or, for £10 per annum, you can become a full member and participate in the Society's subsidised events programme. BP non-pensioner alumni, including those from SMBP, can register by visting the society website. If they become a full member they

John Perry. The Shell-Mex and BP man who changed the face of BP around the world

1960, the year that John Perry joined Shell-Mex and B.P. as a nineteen-year-old fresh from school, was arguably the time that the company was at its apogee of fame and success. Fifteen years after the end of the War and fifteen years before Brand Separation SMBP had a dominant position in the British oil industry and it could afford to be very selective in whom it recruited. So when John applied for a job he could not guarantee that his three 'A' levels and his good reports from Wimbledon College would guarantee him a job. His first interview was with Brigadier Devereux of Staff Department who asked him which of the three armed services he had been in. When he said "none of them" as he was too young for National Service the Brigadier said he had never interviewed anyone who had not been in the services and so the interview was abandoned. He was passed to G.L.Gregory of Industrial Lubricants which was more straightforward and THAT was how he came to join that department!

John Perry was born in Sutton, Surrey in 1941 though his family had long lived in Battersea before heading into leafier surroundings in Stoneleigh just before the war. His father was with North Thames Gas and his mother was a model at Gorringes, the famous Department store. Wimbledon College was a Grammar School and John recalls that when he started work SMBP was full of public school and military 'chaps'. This was to be less prevalent in the new era that began about the time he joined. His exam results had been good enough for University but he decided that he wanted to work and save money to buy a motor bike. What did SMBP see in this eager young man? Perhaps there were signs of his ability to work without supervision and his love of 'process' combined with a logical mind. These were to be the characteristics which drove his very successful career.

With hindsight we know that anyone having a full career in SMBP/Shell/ BP starting around 1960 would spend fifteen years in SMBP and twenty-five in one of the 'parent' companies. In John's case this was to be BP where he reached closer to the very top – something that he shared with other SMBP alumni like Viv Thomas and Peter Cast. SMBP was clearly a good training ground for a senior oil executive with ambition. And John Perry certainly did not lack the latter. He started in 1960 as a junior clerk in Industrial Lubricants and then in 1962 became a senior clerk in Real Estate Department - the beginning of his long career in Retail. In 1964 he had a 'Sales Panel' and became a Real Estate Negotiator in the Midlands. By 1968, post McKinsey, he had risen to 'Head of Marketing Services' in Birmingham – his first management job (a department of 37) at the age

of 27. By then he had studied for an HNC in Business Studies at City of London College on Day release and later he got a degree from a correspondence course at London University. SMBP encouraged and paid for these studies. In the same year John and Pat's first child was born – they had married in 1966. Two more were to follow fairly rapidly but then John said that was enough as you couldn't fit four children into an Austin 1100.

The McKinsey recommendations included the creation of Marketing Managers in Retail and Industrial - jobs that were deputy to the Regional Manager. In 1971 John was appointed to the Midland Region BP post reporting to Trevor Martin. It was a time of change in Retail with promotions galore and a new approach to site management pioneered by Gerald Ronson (at Heron) and Alan Pond. The BP brand in Birmingham copied Pond by creating 'Polygon' which grew to over 20 sites and John was at the heart of this – he was clearly on the

John Perry was accompanied on the study tour by Mr. F. O. Jeppe-sen Assistant General Manager of BP's Marketing Department in London. Mr. Jeppesen is on a two-year secondment to BP London from BP Denmark.

move. Geoff Sheppard, the legendary BP Retail Divisional Manager, had spotted that John was a special asset and in 1972 he spent three weeks in Australia and New Zealand. This brief international exposure made an impression on John and he thought that he would enjoy working internationally should the opportunity arise. It would!

As RMM in Birmingham John Perry had a structured approach to Retail planning, particularly in respect of site acquisition and development, that appealed to the BP Retail hierarchy and the Region secured some 80% of the capital budget - the golden prize of Retail resource allocation. In 1973 he was asked to apply this same approach in South Eastern Region and moved south to Knightsbridge to work with Gerry Long. It was around this time that he learned he would be going, unsurprisingly, to BP on Brand Separation in 1976.

But before then John's career took a surprising turn. John Riddle-Webster, the most senior SMBP man to be allocated to BP, called him in and asked him to take over as Marketing Manager for BP Aguaseal – a bitumen company and Joint Venture with Berry

Wiggins in Kent. This was described as a 'Development Job'. John labels the company as being 'run by the factory' with a strong Union and many Spanish practices. John introduced a proper branded marketing approach and managed to improve the efficiency of what had been a rather moribund and old-fashioned company.

After one spell in General Management another was to follow in 1978 when John returned to the world of Retail to be Director of Sealand Petroleum – a large BP company owned site chain which had absorbed Polygon. (The Sealand equivalent at Shell was City Petroleum). With 120 prime sites, 660 staff and a turnover of £90m this was a major business. He took over from Maurice Garwood and found that the buck very much stopped at his desk. One interesting learning point was that he found female site and area managers were generally much more attuned to the new world of Retail with its emphasis on shops than their male counterparts! Things were moving on fast from the rather male world of SMBP!

By 1980, the year in which John Perry celebrated his 39th birthday, he had built a solid business track record as he climbed the company hierarchy - especially in Retail. This led to his being appointed to his first International job in Britannic House as Manager of the Retail Branch in the International Marketing Department which worked with BP Associates around the world in the development of Retail strategy. In those days the power was with the country-based Associates so considerable subtlety, based on building good relationships with Retail mangers worldwide, was required. One assignment was to 'brand separate' a number of Shell/ BP joint ventures in Africa for which John had, of course, a recent personal experience.

By the early 1980s John Perry was firmly on the map in BP not just in the UK but worldwide. This was to lead to his secondment to BP Oil New Zealand in Wellington as Director and Assistant General Manager Marketing



and Operations. There were two separate BP Companies - BP New Zealand and Europa and each had their own Retail Brand. Mobil was market leader with 28%, then Shell 22%, Europa 17%, Caltex 17% and lastly BP at 15%. John thought if they could rebrand the Europa sites as BP it would give clear market leadership to BP. But that was, surprisingly, too big a step for the local management. The two companies did however merge marketing organisations, retaining the two brands. John says that, once again, experience in SMBP was invaluable. In 1989 the Europa sites were rebranded BP.

When John Perry had his feet firmly on the career ladder as BP Retail Marketing Manager in 1971 (his first 'branded' job) he thought that the height of his ambition was one day to be BP Retail Division Manager - the



top job. In 1986 this dream came true when he returned from New Zealand to take over in Victoria Street, and soon to BP's new offices in Hemel Hempstead. With Viv Thomas as his boss as Marketing Director and Peter Cast as Finance Director there was an SMBP flavour around. Brand loyalty being what it is one of his first tasks was to tackle a problem that the petrol station next to where the new BP office

was under construction was a Shell site! Who was John's Shell opposite number - no less than his old SMBP colleague John Bamberg! A battle ensued with Bamberg holding out for a site swap between Shell Hemel and one of BP's star sites elsewhere. It was a hard-nosed battle and a deal was eventually done - the site remains BP branded to this day (see photograph). During John's time as Retail Manager there was the task of rebranding the National sites, developing Convenience Stores, and being involved in the Monopolies Commission investigation into petroleum retailing on behalf of BP.

After two years as UK Retail Manager in mid-1988 John moved back to Britannic House as Manager of a reimaging Project across all businesses of BP Oil International worldwide. BPs image varied from country to country and the 7000 sites in the USA, for example, were under 6 different logos as a result of past acquisitions. Project Horizon was a \$500 million programme to standardise BPs logo, colours and décor on all 22,000 filling stations and all vehicles, products and facilities around the world. John worked with design companies and other suppliers on this huge project. Green had always been one of BPs colours and a colour not used by the major competitors. It was decided to maximise the use of green so it would become synonymous with BP in the marketplace. It also involved the updating of the BP



Shield logo. After a number of other assignments including a major one at the time of the Mobil acquisition John, now a member of the BP Leadership Team (the top 300 people in BP worldwide), retired in 1999 as 'Global Retail Development Manager' with nearly forty years' service. But his BP (and re-imaging) days were not done. With the Amoco merger it was necessary to create a new Brand identity for the USA that would have a global application. A design and implementation team was set up and BP asked John to join it. He was reengaged by BP, through an agency, as a consultant. They managed to

introduce the BP brand on all sites in the US and apply the colour green The BP shield, however, had to be replaced and the new logo you see today (known as the "Helios") was introduced. The graphic shows the logo as it was used in SMBP from 1947 to 1975, the modified Shield introduced in the John Perry managed project in 1989 and the new logo introduced following the review in 1999 to which John was the prime contributor as a consultant.

John Perry's long career in SMBP/BP was a steady progression upwards and he pays tribute today to the

essential part that SMBP played in his first fifteen years. John is convenor of the 'Grandfathers' Club' membership of which comprises ex senior Shell-Mex and B. P. staff who are arandfathers. John qualified in 2001 when the first of a new generation of Perrys was born. Talking with John three things are particularly apparent. His utter loyalty to SMBP and BP. His devotion to his family and finally his passion for Chelsea Football Club. And why not! (Please don't write and tell me, this is a rhetorical question). **PSB**

The early days of Shell-Mex and B.P.

The United Kingdom was economically and politically in a difficult state in 1931. "A crisis of muddle which no one properly understood led to a General Election [in October] of unrivalled confusion" as AJP Taylor later put it. ¹There was a run on the pound, budget and balance of payments deficits and chronic unemployment. There was a political battle between those who favoured protectionism and those who supported free trade. The climate for business continued to be unpropitious – still suffering from the Wall Street crash of 1929 and the collapse of employment which affected demand and led to extreme hardship.

The senior management of Shell-Mex Limited (Royal Dutch Shell's UK subsidiary) and British Petroleum opened talks in secret to see if there was scope for a defensive efficiencydriven merger of their operations. There was however a leak and 'The Times' of October 17th revealed the plans in outline - 'Last night an official announcement was issued to the effect that the Anglo-Persian and Royal Dutch-Shell groups are creating a company to ensure close cooperation between the distributing businesses conducted at present by the British Petroleum and Shell-Mex companies in the United Kingdom and Ireland...this cooperation should result in substantial economies' On November 14th they revealed that a new company 'Shell-Mex and B.P.' had been registered (see press cutting below). SMBP had been held two days earlier, though the staffs of the merging companies had to wait until 18th December for the official announcement! The rest, as they say, is history! **PSB**

COOPERATION IN OIL DISTRIBUTION

SHELL-MEX AND B.P. LIMITED

In our issue of October 17 last reference was made to the formation of a company to ensure close cooperation between the distributing businesses conducted at present by the British Petroleum (Anglo-Persian) and Shell-Mex (Royal Dutch-Shell) companies in the United Kingdom and Ireland. According to Messrs. Jordan and Sons' daily register, the new company—Shell-Mex and B.P. Limited was registered as a private company on November 12 with a nominal capital of £100 in £1 shares (50 "A" and 50 "B" shares) to carry on the business of refiners, storers, transporters, suppliers, sellers, and distributors of petroleum and other oils and any products thereof, &c. The members are classified as the "Persian "group, the "Shell " group, and the "Eagle" group.

In Memoriam

Tony Blackburn

Tony Blackburn, who had died at the age of 91, joined National Benzole in 1957 and worked in Retail in the Shell-Mex and B.P. Group, and BP, for the rest of his forty-year career. Starting as a Real Estate Representative he progressed to Real Estate Manager, London Division for National and then for SMBP in Eastern Division in 1963. He was Head of Retail Reorganisation from 1971-1973 preparing for Brand Separation and at BP he headed up the Retail Strategic Planning unit and was later Manager of the Retail Estate Branch. In 1985 he was project manager for the construction of the £7m South Mimms Motorway service area on the M25 described at the time as the 'most advanced in Europe' with 19 pump islands and a range of restaurants.

Tony retired in 1987. He thoroughly enjoyed his retirement and often had difficulty fitting everything in. He and his wife Julia had a large garden with twenty-four vegetable beds, a fruit cage, 70 odd fruit trees and a pond. He also played short mat bowls, went bird-watching and on rainy days and in the winter he prepared his stamp collection which is now part of the Spanish Civil War Collection in the British Library.




He had a stroke in 2010 and, although it seemed to have little effect at the time, it gradually became apparent that some areas of his brain had suffered quite badly so that lots of ordinary things became quite difficult. He went to live in a local care home in July 2017 where he was well looked after.

On retirement Peter threw himself whole-heartedly into helping to run the SMBP 44 Club both locally in East Anglia, where he became Regional Coordinator, and centrally where among other things he administered the 44 Club Diaries. Club Chairman Rick Westley has said "Peter was a fabulous 44 Club contributor and such a force in the East for us and all his members. He will be sadly missed."

Peter's family was the most important thing in his life and at his funeral in February his three children, grandchildren and friends paid a moving tribute to a man as loved at home as he was respected and liked at work. RIP Jimmy. **PSB**


Remembering David Langdon

Representing the Group is AUBREY HOUSTON, who also serves on numerous outside bodies, and is a past Captain of the Royal County Down Golf Club...


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
