The quote from L.P.Hartley's 'The Go-Between' "The past is a foreign country; they do things differently there." has, I think, appeared in this magazine before. The narrator, Leo, is remembering back fifty years to a time when he was young and mores and behaviours were, well, different. We are not there yet but half a century after Shell-Mex and B.P. ceased trading is not far away. And its hard not, occasionally, to mumble "They would never have done that in my day"!

SMBP is seen from a modern vantage point as being paternalistic - a slightly derogatory term to mean that the company cared for its staff, and its pensioners. The formation of the SMBP 44 Association was obvious evidence of that. Did this paternalism mean that the company was a bit less efficient than it could have been (a euphemism for 'over-staffed') – perhaps it did. But it also created a loyalty that is fairly rare in business today. Most of us in the 44 Club worked for SMBP and then Shell or BP for thirty, forty or even fifty years. Loyalty given was in no small measure a return for loyalty received.

The 44 Club is not a campaigning organisation – it wasn't originally set up to be and it still isn't. Once the SMBP Pension Fund had been absorbed into the Shell Contributory Pension Fund we all became either Shell or BP Pensioners. The 44 Club is a heritage club not an overtly activist one! But in the last few months both those of us who receive a pension from Shell and those in the BP Fund will have been concerned by the ongoing evidence that paternalism is just a happy memory. All of us have to adapt to a situation where the purchasing power of our pensions is not keeping up with inflation any more. Many pensioners in both Shell and BP have organised to make the Companies reflect more on this unprecedented situation. We must wish them well.

We are an aging band of brigands but a jolly one - all two thousand of us! There aren't too many gloomy faces in the photographs recording Branch events! Sadly, we do inevitably lose some 44 Club stalwarts and in this edition of the Club News we mark the passing of Peter Cast our ex-Chairman and among the Club's keenest supporters. To those who remember Peter, and all the other Club members listed in the Obits, our condolences.

In Memoriam

Peter Cast

In his many incarnations in SMBP, BP and the 44 Club amongst them Peter Cast brought a quizzical and always thoughtful approach to even the most intractable problems. Blessed with a powerful intellect, a fine University education and strong interpersonal skills Peter made a mark with a combination of geniality and incisiveness as he rose though the ranks.

Peter was born in 1934 and was a graduate of the London School of Economics. He joined SMBP in 1956 starting in Mark Weinstein's Trade Relations where he met Bridget Povah who was to become his wife – she predeceased him.

When Don Lindsell arrived in SMBP in the 1960s to set up "Marketing Economics and Group Planning" (MEGP) Peter joined him as Assistant Manager for economic, energy and oil forecasting - a job he did for more than ten years. It was an intellectual powerhouse! At Brand Separation he went to BP as Corporate Planning Manager before returning to BP Oil to be (in his words) "Odds and Sods Director" which included Finance, Computing, Personnel and Office Services. Together with Ian Ward he oversaw the move to Hemel Hempstead and



later returned to Britannic House as GM Property and Office Services.

Peter retired from BP in 1991 and was immediately active in the 44 Club at Chelmsford Branch and also on the Executive Committee of the Club overall. In 2005 he succeeded Brian Bowden as Chairman of the Club and he continued in this role until, at the age of 80, he stood down in 2014. He will be much missed.

Ian Ward, the consummate 'people person' who made it to the top

We met at 'The Lensbury', as the once Club is now called, somewhere that Ian Ward said that he had not visited for over fifty years. Since his Shell-Mex and B.P. days in fact. Those days began in 1964 when at the tender age of 25 but with already some life experiences under his belt. lan joined SMBP in the Manchester Regional office. Ian is proud of his Manchester roots - he is from the blue side of the City (hence the smile - he has supported Manchester City for 78 years) and grew up in a council house in South Manchester. His father was a laboratory technician (later a manager) and lan was bright enough to go to a Grammar School and then become the first member



of his family to go to University. He studied Botany and graduated well though his Professor was to tell him that he would "... make a lot of money, but you won't be a botanist". This was rather perceptive as lan's successful career was to lead to an enjoyable lifestyle and retirement, but his career was to be as a generalist, eventually at close to the highest level, rather than as a specialist. Unless you regard man management as a specialism that is - which in lan's case you certainly should.

After University Ian joined the Milk Marketing Board as a Graduate



Trainee and found himself working on cheese. When at school he had met Beryl, a romance blossomed and in June 1963 they were married. (photo left). Beryl worked in the Manchester Regional Office of National Benzole and lan, tiring a little of Double Gloucester, wondered whether there might be a job in SMBP. He was interviewed by Victor Skone Rees and told that to be a Sales Rep he had to be 24 years of age, so he decided to work as a Science teacher at a Secondary Modern School in Trafford Park - as you do! He was there for a year and a term before seeing Skone Rees again and this time, as a mature twenty-four-yearold, he became an SMBP Rep in North Lancashire, Soon, showing promise. he was moved to a Retail Outlet Development job working for David Parry. They were exciting times in Retail with Solus, Self-Serve, Green Shield Stamps and lan was a quick learner. Within a few years he was moved to Head Office working for Mark Mothio and with

Don Chadwick and George Milne. He liked National – they were more free to experiment than Shell and BP. Ian headed up Shops and Car Care products for a while. He discovered that the SMBP bureaucracy was not especially conducive to fast moving goods sales – there was a nineteen-year stockholding of one item! He says that one lesson he learned was that it was better not to get involved in what you don't know about, as NB had

At the age of 31 Ian became
National's youngest Area Manager
– the Area was the West Country and
he and Beryl moved to Exmouth. He
had a close relationship with the Shell
and BP Area Managers and looks
on those years as a good stepping
stone. Exeter was the best NB Area
in 1972 and in the run up to Brand
Separation Ian was also asked to
take over the Southampton Area so
he now had fourteen reps in total and
was driving 2500 miles a month.

The run up to Brand Separation was an uncertain time for all SMBP staff. Ian was surprised at the job offer he received to go to BP in Leeds (Yorkshire!) as High Street Lubricants Manager. He knew little of Lubricants and the High Street market was rather different to anything he'd experienced before. But they had a strong brand in Viscostatic and a major customer In Asda. He was working for Maurice Garwood who was the BP Retail Regional Manager and was to become a good friend. A large and clever deal with Asda rather made lan's name in the sector. And when Garwood moved on Ian became first acting and then, in 1976, he was appointed Regional Manager. He was 37! Ian then worked on a

team set up by John Riddell-Webster and Geoff Shepherd to reorganise Retail, just a year or so after Brand Separation. Major changes took place.

The rise and rise of Ian Ward was driven by his ability to adapt to any new challenge. After the reorganisation he became first the Retail Sales Development Manager and then in 1980 Ted Hawkes asked him to be Aviation Operations Manager despite his knowing nothing about Aviation and little about Operations! A couple of years later. after a brief stint as Retail's UK Sales Manager, Ian was offered what he now says was the "most rewarding time in his whole career" - he was appointed Manager of Distribution Division.

So soon after Brand Separation it was clear to the BP hierarchy that Distribution was over-staffed, inefficient, and full of 'Spanish practices'. Performance standards were 'all over the place', union relations poor and the business needed transforming. In the last three vears. Ian succeeded in streamlining the business. He pays tribute fulsomely to the first class team who worked with him. The political climate of the time supported a strong approach to industrial relations and BP's Directors supported change which was delivered reducing employee numbers and costs considerably and introducing a new productivity agreement. During lan's time in BP Distribution another ex SMBP 'Grandfather' was his opposite number in Shell.


If you are getting the impression that in those rather fraught times Ian Ward was BP's go-to Mr Fixit you'd be right! Next he was asked by David Kendall, BP's top man, to become Personnel Manager and drive the company's move of 1250 staff from London to a new office in Hemel Hempstead. He worked on this with old SMBP


six European countries. It was a disruptive time personally as Beryl could not move to Germany and although lan, as ever, delivered what his bosses wanted he was thinking of seeking a new challenge. This was to come in 1991 when he was offered the job of Director General of the Institute of Petroleum (the IP) in London. After nearly thirty years in SMBP/BP and at the age of 52 it was a challenge, like all the others, one he relished. He stayed in the job for eight years which, he recalls, was the "by far the longest period I had spent in the same job"! He formally retired on 31st August 1999 at the age of 60.

Whilst Ian Ward's business career was remarkable both talking with him and reading his excellent memoir "My Life Story" it is clear that without question his family has always come first – not always the case with the high-priced help! His two sons and three grandchildren are important to him, particularly so after the death of Beryl a couple of years ago after a battle with Alzheimer's – for some years Ian was her carer.

Ian is a Grandfather, both in fact and as a member of the ex SMBP group of Senior Managers which meets from time to time to lunch and reminisce. In many ways he is the archetypical ex SMBP success story his career furthered by exceptional man management skills and integrity. And hard work. He maintained his work/



life balance whilst effortlessly climbing a pole that at times was very greasy indeed. The Lensbury venue may once have been a Shell one, but this delightful BP man told his story with modesty and charm. He was anxious to stress that whilst he was from time to time the Captain steering this ship he was helped by very talented colleagues. He was, he insists, not a 'One-Man Band!' It was an honour to spend time with one of SMBP's most distinguished alumni. And he bought me lunch! PSB



'Victor's Isle of Arran Adventures!'


In May this year the majority of Victor Southgate, born on the Isle of Arran, ioined Scottish Oils and Shell-Mex in 1965 and for the first five years he was a tanker driver based in Ardrossan Terminal. He then moved to Bishopbriggs for seven years and finally to Glasgow Airport for eighteen years. When he retired he was able to spend much more time on the golf course (He plays off 8 at 80 and at his peak he was close to scratch). And he has just published his first book - 'Victor's Isle of Arran Adventures.' The preface to the book reads as follows:

"My family had a history of numerous ties to Brodick Castle (below) through my maternal and paternal grandfathers' employment with the Duke and Duchess of Montrose



as well as my father and his three siblings growing up with the four Montrose children in the 1920s on the picturesque Isle of Arran off the west coast of Scotland.

In 1957 I embarked on some of my life's most memorable adventures when Lady Jean (Montrose)
Fforde employed me for a variety of positions within her Arran
Estate. Lady Jean and I shared a truly unforgettable deer hunting experience in North Glen Sannox on the day we encountered a white stag known to have a significant symbolic



meaning to a legend linked to her Hamilton descendants.


I hope you will enjoy my stories about growing up on a small Scottish Island and the fun people I grew up with, worked with, and some of the more colourful characters I met along the way."

Vic's book is an entertaining. enjoyable, and well-written read. The Hunting, Shooting and Fishing world of Scotland may be a closed book to most of us, but Vic brings it to life vividly. He also describes the social structure of the past with style and with a twinkle in his eye. At the top of the pile were many with titles. Dougarie Lodge, on the Estate, was built in 1864/65 as a shooting lodge for William Hamilton the 11th Duke of Hamilton. The Duke had three children one of whom, Mary, married Prince Albert of Monaco. Among the visitors, in 1929, were the young Prince Rainier of Monaco and his sister Princess Antionette. They wrote to Vic's Grandfather to thank him for giving them lovely donkey rides!

Vic's time in Scottish Oils gets a brief mention and a request. Here is what he says:

"In 1976 I was a participant on the Executive Committee for Shell Aviation... representing all the airport workers for wages, terms and conditions and pensions. This was the time of Brand Separation, and I was a Senior Aircraft Fueller. Representing BP was a young woman, Miss Murchie – a high flier who came from Shiskine on Arran. She asked me if I was related to Willie Southgate the Shiskine postman – I told her he was my uncle. I would love to know how she got on at BP!"




